#### LISTENING TO SILENCE: EXPLORING PRAYER WHEN THERE'S NOBODY THERE

*Tina Beattie.* I shall explore in more depth some of the questions I'll be addressing in my talk. I shall invite people to think of what speaks to them when they have no sense of the presence of God in their lives. I feel in these dark and difficult times, there are so many challenges and ques-

tions confronting us. I know that some people find joy and affirmation in celebratory worship and prayer, but I'm interested in asking what kind of language and expressiveness might sustain us in times of struggle and doubt, when we might not be drawn to familiar patterns of worship and prayer. Tina Beattie is a theologian, writer and broadcaster, a regular contributor to Thought for the Day on BBC Radio 4. Until August 2020, she was the Professor of Catholic Studies at the University of Roehampton in London and Director of the Digby Stuart Research Centre for Religion, Society and Human Flourishing at the same university.
